Dear PhD students

The Graduate School at the Faculty of Humanities is happy to present its generic courses for 2010!

The programme contains a number of new courses as well as courses from previous years that have been reconceptualised to fit current requirements. These are generic in nature and developed on the basis of the requests made by enrolled PhD students and their continuous evaluations of previous courses.

In order to accommodate a demand for knowledge on research ethics, a new course has been designed in cooperation with other faculties at the University of Copenhagen:

- **Taking your Role as a Researcher Seriously: Ethical Aspects of Academic Research in the Humanities, Social Sciences and Law**

Another new course regards methods, rules of thumb and hints for English language presentations at international conferences and seminars:

- **Conference Presentations in English**

Following requests, the Graduate School is now able to offer a course on how to put the finishing touches on your dissertation. This involves tools for managing the final stages of writing:

- **Final Stages in Writing your PhD Dissertation**

All courses will be held in English except for the courses on disseminating research results to a broader Danish audience. Courses may be conducted in Danish if all attending PhD students understand and speak Danish.

You should consult the PhD programmes of the Graduate School if you require courses related to specific disciplines within the humanities. Further information is available at the Graduate School website. You might have looked for courses from previous years in vain. DETAILED INFORMATION ON COURSE REGISTRATION, ATTENDANCE AND PREPARATION

With around 220 enrolled PhD students, of whom 55-60 are in their first year, the number participating in Graduate School courses averages around 16 per course. This ensures that all courses will be held, however, waiting lists have been known to arise. For this reason most courses are held annually or biannually, so that you can plan ahead.

It is important that you consider when is the best time during your studies to register for which courses. Please note that you are supposed to take the course in *Practical Teaching Skills* prior to the semester when you start your teaching obligations, since the course takes concrete teaching tasks facing you as its point of departure. Please read the introduction to each course carefully. It specifies which stage of the PhD study programme they address. Course registration happens on-line at the PhD course website (http://phd.hum.ku.dk/phd_skole/kurser/) for all PhD students enrolled at the Graduate School. Admittance to the courses is on a first come, first served basis. Courses are also open for PhD students enrolled at other Graduate Schools of the University of Copenhagen or other universities on the payment of a fee (DKK 1.200 for 1 ECTS course point); however, priority is given to students enrolled at the Faculty of Humanities. PhD students who are interested may contact the PhD Centre for further information and registration (phdcenter@hum.ku.dk).

Courses offered by the Graduate School have all been given prior approval by the PhD committee. A diploma with course title and ECTS points will be awarded and handed out at the end of each course.

You will only be awarded ECTS points for courses that have been completed without absence. In case of partial absence, you will need to retake the entire course when it is repeated after a semester or two. In such a case, you will be given priority when re-registering.

All courses are electronically evaluated and we kindly request your participation to make it possible for the Graduate School to improve and strengthen the overall quality of future courses.

All courses start at the time stated and **not** a quarter of an hour after the advertised time (*akademisk kvarter*). Please pay respect to the teacher of the course and fellow PhD students by being on time and having prepared all reading assignments if any.

TAKING YOUR ROLE AS A RESEARCHER SERIOUSLY: ETHICAL ASPECTS OF ACADEMIC RESEARCH IN THE HUMANITIES, SOCIAL SCIENCES AND LAW

The aim of this course is to introduce PhD students from the humanities, social sciences and law to a range of basic concepts, principles and norms, which in turn will enable them to understand and reflect upon ethical questions and requirements pertaining to their research.

The course consists of four modules described more fully on the course website. The first module focuses upon basic questions of academic inquiry in terms of truth, relevance and academic freedom. The second module focuses upon moral norms involved in qualitative research, while the third module focuses upon issues of plagiarism. In the fourth module, these various themes are discussed and brought to bear on the participants' own research projects.

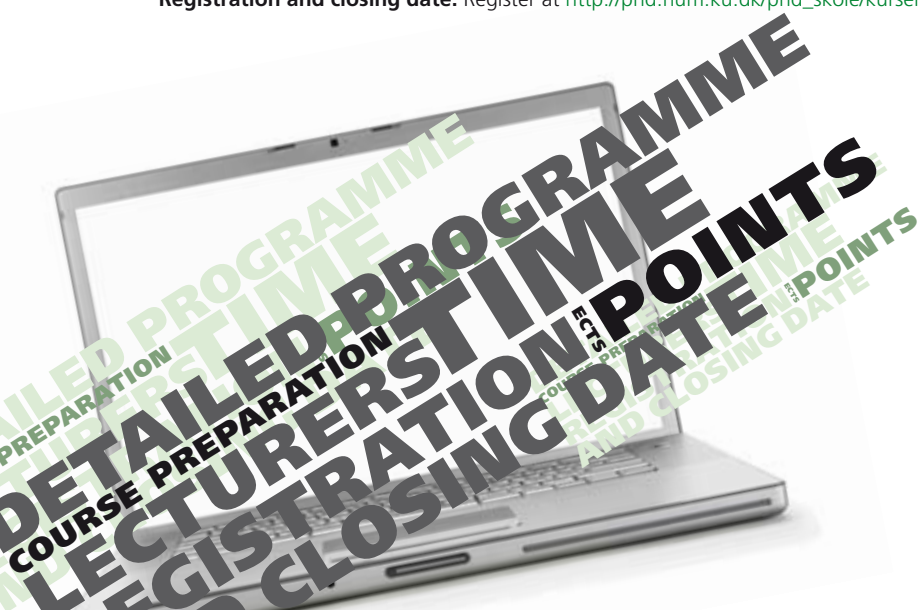

PREPARED FOR CONFERENCES: ABSTRACTS AND PRESENTATIONS (COURSE A)

This course focuses on presenting a paper at an academic conference, i.e. how to present your focal point, your theoretical background, methodology and central argument.

You will be presenting an abstract/proposal for all participants and be given a non-evaluative helpful feed-forward on your potentials as a presenter.

Note that preparations for this course may also be used for Course B focusing on conference presentations in English as a second language.

The goal is to teach you how to give a presentation and reply to questions and criticism with the same confidence and clarity as in your mother tongue.

This is a follow-up course to *Prepared for conferences: Abstracts and presentations (Course A)* which covers higher level concerns (structure, central argument etc.).

COURSE IN GENERAL PHILOSOPHY OF SCIENCE

The aim of this course is to place research within the humanities in a broader philosophy of science context. Points of similarity and contrast will be established between the humanities and other main areas of research, also general issues regarding the nature of science will be addressed.

The course is meant to deepen participant understanding of own discipline-specific methodologies by cross-disciplinary comparison and reflection on conceptualizations of science and research in general. The course addresses both abstract and formal features of scientific activities, including the products and various social aspects of life as a researcher.
